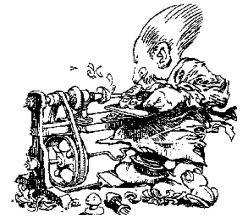

So You Think You're An Antique . . . ?

Do you want to have the biggest lathe on your block? The pictures below show a P. Pryibil #6 antique wood lathe. P. Pryibil was in business in New York from 1887 till his death in 1909. He sold a variety of woodworking machines with great success. This lathe will turn 17" on center. The wooden bed is 12' long, and you can make the bed longer if you want. Also, since the lathe is belt-driven, you might need a large waterwheel nearby. By the way, this lathe sold for \$20.50 on eBay on June 29th.



Richmond Woodturning Symposium Trip Report

This was one of the best symposiums I have attended. As I looked over the schedule of the day to figure out how to see everything, I tried to deduce how my wife exceeds the laws of physics so I too could be in five places at once, but had no success.

The convention center was great, and I never thought I would say this, so was the food. During the lunch break, the staff was ready to make you a fresh sandwich, pizza, hamburger . . . not soggy cardboard. The presentation rooms were large with plenty of chairs, good sound, and large viewing screens with three cameras on the presenter and lathe.

The presentations covered making lidded boxes, piercing a hollow form to illustrate negative space, textures, and color. They were turning bowls, boxes, hollow form vases, square bowls, multi-access shapes, texturing, and describing how to look at wood. The best vendor demonstrations were conducted by Stuart Beatty from England, Soren Burger from New Zealand, and a number of others.

The vendor’s area was a place for you to stretch your resolve to keep your money in your pocket. There were a number of lathes: Robust, One Way, and a couple I had not seen before. The lathes were all saying, “Take me home. We do ship!” There were two rose lathes, patterned after the real Ornamental Rose lathes, at a far lesser pricing. The wood varieties available were uncountable.

Skewed Points

Ever wonder how fast those pieces of your almost-finished masterpiece are moving after that really annoying catch? As you may know from personal experience, the detached pieces can have disastrous consequences if you happen to be standing in the wrong place. The examples below provide the math to determine the miles per hour speed at the edge of the turning piece using the pen-and-ink method, and also the formula components if you want to use a spreadsheet such as Microsoft® Excel. - Bill Draper

Manual method: $MPH = (RPM * \frac{60 * \pi * D}{12 * 5280})$

Spreadsheet method:

	A	B	C
1	Lathe RPM	3000	<<enter RPM in cell B1>>
2	Item Diameter	16	<<enter piece diameter in cell B2>>
3	MPH at Outer Edge	142.80	<<enter formula in cell B3: =(B1*(60*PI()*B2))/(12*5280) >>

Product Safety Note

DeWALT Recalls Cordless Drills due to Fire Hazard

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in cooperation with DeWalt, announced a voluntary recall of the following cordless drills.

Name of Product: DEWALT Cordless Drills

Units: About 346,000

Manufacturer: DEWALT Industrial Tool Company, of Towson, Md.

Hazard: The trigger switch of the cordless drill can overheat, posing a fire hazard to consumers.

Incidents/Injuries: DEWALT has received 11 reports of trigger switches overheating. No injuries or property damage have been reported.

Description: This recall involves DEWALT individual cordless drills listed below:

DC940	Heavy-Duty XRP™ 1/2" (13mm) 12 Volt Cordless Drill/Driver	200635 through 200746

The model number is printed on a sticker on the side of the unit. The date code is embossed on the bottom of the unit. Units stamped with an “M” following the date code have been repaired and are not included in this recall. The packaging of repaired drills has a green dot sticker near the UPC label.

Sold at: Wholesale distributors and retailers from about June 2006 through December 2007 for between \$180 and \$280.

Manufactured in: Mexico

Remedy: Consumers should stop using the drills immediately and contact DEWALT for the location of the nearest service center to receive a free inspection and, if necessary, free repair.

Tips and Techniques

Faceplates from 2 to 4 inches in diameter can be purchased from a variety of sources for \$20 to \$40 or more. However, you can make your own faceplates for much less - less than \$5 per faceplate. With nuts

that fit your headstock, and steel fender washers or flanges the size of the faceplate you need, you can build one to suit your specifications. You can weld it yourself, head to your local welder, or give Dave Rich a call and have the parts welded together. Do not forget to plan where you want to drill the holes in the washer so that you have space where screws can be inserted flush and separate from the weld bead. Better yet, drill the holes prior to welding, maybe 4 or 5 holes. A good weld is essential, and the larger the faceplate/washer the better! – Dave Rich

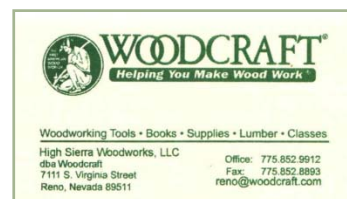
