

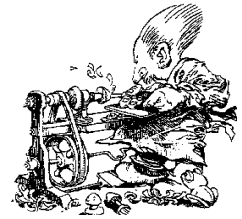

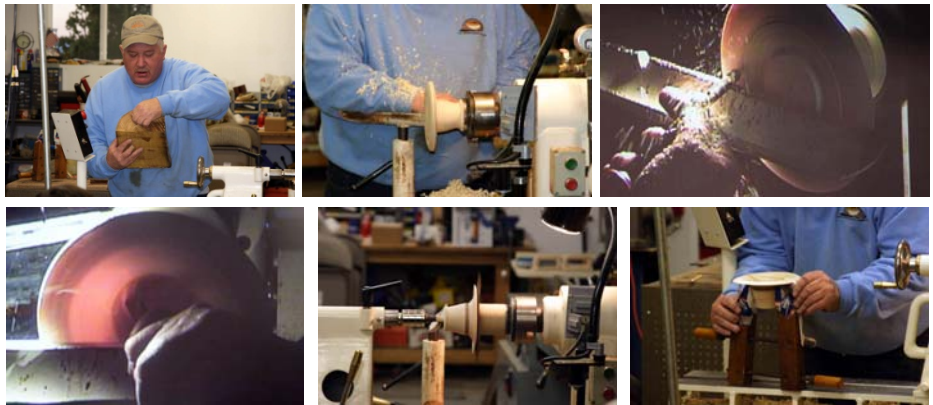

Skewed Points, Revisited

In last month's newsletter, Bill Draper provided two simple computer spreadsheet routines to determine the size of a plug to insert into an undersized Forstner drill hole. In my engineering practice, I too often see engineers use a computer program to solve a simple math problem, often leading to mistakes either because the program was used incorrectly or the wrong program was chosen.

If you need to re-drill a hole and wish to use a square plug, find the side of the square simply by dividing the diameter of the undersize hole by 1.414 (which is the square root of 2).

If you have some narrow stock and wish to use a rectangular plug, find the long side of the rectangle by taking the square root of (the diameter squared – the width of the plug squared).

Even the simplest of calculators can find the square and square root of numbers, so there is no need to fuss with a computer. – Wayne Ferree

Hartville Tool Discount Program

In March 2009 Carson Valley Woodturners was approved to participate in the Hartville Tool Woodworking Club Discount Program. During the first year club members receive a 20% discount on all regularly priced items. Beginning the second year, the discount goes to 15%. Umbellularia

Umbellularia californica is a tree native to coastal forests of western North America. Its pungent leaves have a similar flavor to bay leaves (though stronger), and it may be mistaken for Bay Laurel.



In Oregon, this tree is known as Oregon Myrtle, while in California it is called California Bay Laurel, which may be shortened to California Bay or California Laurel. It has also been called Acacia, California Olive, Pepperwood, and Headache Tree.



It is the sole species in the genus *Umbellularia*. It ranges near the coast from Oregon south through California. It is also found in the western foothills of the Sierra Nevada. It occurs at altitudes from sea level up to 1600 m.

It is an evergreen tree growing to 30 m tall (exceptionally 45 m) with a trunk up to 80 cm thick. The leaves are smooth-edged and lens shaped, 3–10 cm long and 1.5–3 cm broad, similar to the related Bay

Laurel though usually narrower, and without the crinkled margin of that species. The flowers are small, yellow or yellowish-green, produced in a small umbel (hence the scientific name *Umbellularia*, "little umbel"). The fruit is a round and green berry 2–2.5 cm long and 2 cm broad, lightly spotted with yellow, maturing purple. It consists of a fleshy covering over a single hard, thin-shelled seed. The California Bay is the primary foliar host for Sudden Oak Death (SOD).

Properties

Umbellularia is heavy, hardwearing, and resilient. It can be a difficult wood to work, and has a rapid blunting effect on cutting edges. A reduced cutting angle is recommended for planning and molding. However, it glues, bores, nails, and screws well, and polished very well. It is prized by woodturners for its excellent turning properties.

Uses

The leaf was used by western US Native Americans as a cure for headache, toothache, and earache—though the volatile oils in the leaves may also cause headaches when used in excess. Native Americans also consumed the ripe fruits. The leaf is sometimes used in cooking, but is much stronger than the more commercially available Bay Laurel leaf.

Other sources indicate it is used in woodworking. The wood is very hard and fine, and is made into bowls, spoons, and other small items and sold as "myrtlewood". It is also grown as an ornamental tree, both in its native area, and elsewhere further north up the Pacific coast to Vancouver in Canada, and in Western Europe. *U. californica* is a tonewood used to construct the back and sides of acoustic guitars.

Pathology

California Bay Laurel is an important host of Sudden oak death and often reside in forests with Tanoaks, which are also vulnerable to the disease.

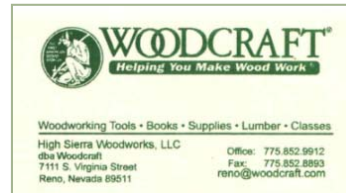
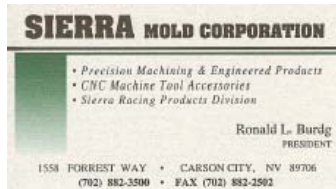
Woodturner's Web Sites
