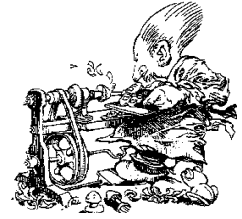

## Turning a Pen the First Time

When I got my first lathe two years ago (I have already purchased a new larger lathe), I purchased it before Christmas. However, my wife would not let me use it until after Christmas; it was my present. My nephew gave me a pen kit for Christmas and I thought it would be an easy project. Little did I know what this would involve. The first thing I did was sign up for a pen turning class at Woodcraft in Reno, which involved taking the safety class first, then on to the pen turning class. The class was very informative and took me through all of the steps. However, it also brought to light all of the other items I would need to complete the pen making process. Before it all ended, with the cost of the lathe and related accessories, I think my first pen cost somewhere around \$ 1,000.00!

Pen turning requires some specialized items not typically used in other types of turning. The first thing you are going to need is a way to cut the pen blank after you have marked it for the barrel length. I did not have a band saw so I cut my blanks by hand. This worked OK until I purchased my new band saw and I now use that. The next thing you will need is a drill press to drill the blank for insertion of the brass barrel. The drill press I had did not extend the 2 inches I needed to drill the pen blank and this resulted in the purchase of a new drill press. I then needed to purchase a pen vice to hold the pen blank so that I could drill it for the barrel. The drill press vice I had did not work well for holding the blank. The next thing I needed was a pen insertion tool to insert the barrel into the blank after coating it with CA glue. I then purchased a barrel trimmer so that I could trim the end of the blank flush with the barrel that had been glued into the blank. The next thing I purchased was a pen turning mandrel which you use to mount the pen blanks for turning between the head and tail stock. This was all fine and good until I looked at the pen turning kit that was given to me and I determined that I also need a special bushing for the type of pen I was turning. Each type of pen requires a bushing for the specific pen design, i.e. slim line, click pen, cigar, etc. I also determined that I needed drill bits for each of the pen designs which I purchased. Once I got the pen turned I now needed to apply the finish. The types of finishes vary, but the one that I prefer is the Mylands Friction Polish. Once the finish was applied I now needed to put all of the pieces together, and for this I purchased a pen press. There are other options than the pen press, i.e. bench vise, pipe clamps, or handed quick action bar clamps. Here is a list of the items that will be needed:

Lathe	Pen blank
Saw	Drill press
Pen vice	Drill bits
CA glue	Insertion tool
Barrel trimmer	Mandrel
Bushing to match the pen type	Pen kit
Sand paper or sanding pads if using acrylic blanks	Finish
	Pen press/assembler

You are now ready to turn your pen by following the steps listed:

1. Remove parts for pen kit and reference the directions
2. Mark pen blank with duel lines for blank identification
3. Rough surface of barrel with sand paper so glue will adhere

4. Drill pen blank with appropriate size drill bit for kit chosen
5. Glue barrel into blank with CA glue
6. Trim end of blank to ensure that the barrel and end of blank are now square to blank
7. Position pen blank on mandrel with appropriate bushing – caution do not over tighten the locking nut as this can cause the mandrel to flex
8. Rough blank down to slightly larger than bushing
9. Sand blank to match bushing diameter
10. Apply finish
11. Assemble pen per instructions

It is not necessary to purchase all of the items that I did, but it was a good excuse for me to purchase several other items such as a new drill press, new band saw, etc., with my wife's approval as our nephew had provided me with the first pen kit. During my demonstration at the January meeting we will discuss and I will demonstrate several of the steps listed above resulting in a finished pen. - John Compston
