

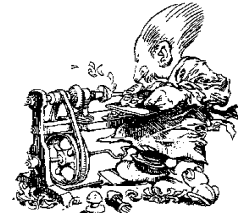

## President's Gouge

I would like to start off by giving a special thanks to Rich Sheldrew for allowing us to use his shop for the all day demonstration given by Sören Berger. I would also like to thank Dave Rich for all of his hard work in setting up special demonstrators for our meetings, and especially this work on bringing Sören to our club. Dave and Ruth also picked Sören up at the airport and hosted him until he left.

Those who attended were treated to an outstanding demonstration. Sören started off by giving us some tips on the use of several gouges. I have already tried several of his techniques with excellent results. Sören went on to turn a maple bowl with



lid, a wooden scoop, and a lamp shade. During his turning of the lamp shade, someone asked if he had ever broken a lampshade at a demonstration and he answered "no". Well, this must have been a bad omen, because as he was parting the shade from the base it spun off of his hand and hit the floor. Sören felt terrible and said that before he left Dave Rich's house he would turn another for the club.



During our Christmas party we will be auctioning off the items that have been turned for the club by presenters at our previous demonstrations.

My son-in-law is the principal of Silver Stage High School in Silver Springs. He had asked me to come out to his wood shop class and put on a demon-

stration to see if we could get the students interested in working on the lathe. On Friday, October 15th, I met with 18 students in the first period advanced shop class and demonstrated the turning of a barrel shaped tooth pick holder. At the beginning of the class I asked how many of the students were interested in the lathe. I had four students raise their hands. At the end of the demonstration, I asked how many would be interested in a lathe workshop, and had ten students raised their hands. I will be working with the principal and shop teacher to work out a schedule for possible workshops for the shop class. It appears that they would like to hold the workshops during school time and they would free the students up for 1/2 day workshops. If this works out, I would propose using the one lathe they



have at the school, and taking two additional mini-lathes. This would allow us to have three students per workshop. We may have to hold the workshops over several days to accommodate all of the students who want to participate.

## Safety Tip

Be aware of what turners call the “red zone” or “firing zone.” This is the area directly behind and in front of the workpiece - the areas most likely for a piece to travel as it comes off the lathe. A good safety habit is to step out of this zone when turning on the lathe, keeping your hand on the switch in case you need to turn the machine off. When observing someone else turn, stay out of this zone. For anyone who has been turning, we all know about the red zone, as most, if not all of us, have had something come off the lathe without the best results. This is one of the main reasons that we constructed shields to be used during the craft fair. In addition to being aware of the red zone, always check the speed of your lathe before turning on the switch. - John Compston

## Can I Make and Sell *Wood*® Magazine Projects?

In the November issue of the subject magazine, a reader asked if it is OK to make and sell projects found in the magazine. The answer from Marlen Kemmet, *Wood*® Magazine’s Managing Editor was, “It depends.” Here is the rest of his reply. “Most of our projects are designed by members of our staff, and you can make as many as you like of those for yourself or as gifts. We do put a limit of 25 on these projects if you intend to sell them. Check the credits at the end of the articles. If you see the project designer’s name anywhere above the list of photographers [on the staff listing page], that designer is a staff member. Projects designed by non-staff designers can only be built for yourself or as gifts; you cannot sell these projects. Brian Simmons, our freelance woodturning consultant, designed the toothpick holder [in this issue] and holds the design rights, so you cannot make and sell the holders without authorization from Brian.”

While this is obviously *Wood*® Magazine’s policy, it probably isn’t a giant leap to speculate that other publications have similar policies. It would certainly seem to be advisable to check with the intellectual property owner before you go into production mode on something you found in a publication. - Bill Draper

## Shop Tip

Most of us use Anchorseal Green Wood Sealer to protect our prized green wood logs and blanks from drying too fast and checking or splitting. If you need to seal green wood frequently, you could be as annoyed as I was with continual opening and closing the gallon or larger can. Several months ago my wife was on the way to the trash can with an empty plastic fabric softener container that has a spring-loaded dispenser valve, and the proverbial light bulb lit up. I washed out the container with hot water, and then funneled the Anchorseal from my gallon can into the repurposed container. Now when I need a small (or larger) amount of Anchorseal, I dispense it into a tuna can, and then seal my wood. This greatly reduces waste, and I no longer have the annoying can to mess with. - Bill Draper
