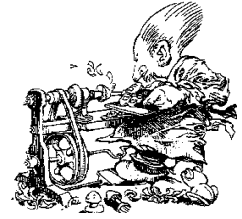

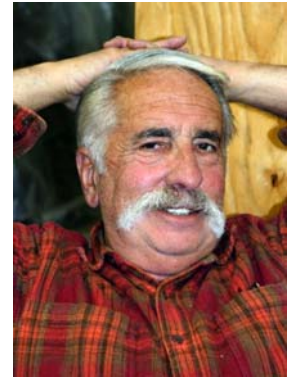

We then brought it back to Dave's shop where club members cut it into pieces, sealed the wood, and made it available to club members. Dave also went to northern California with several club members and picked up black walnut, which was taken to Rich Sheldrew's shop where Rich cut it into slabs. Several club members then cut it into pieces, sealed it, and made it available to club members.

Dave was also the driving force behind the club becoming involved with the Chili Cook-Off Craft Fair. Through our attendance at this event, the club was able to enhance club activities, and we picked up several new members who saw us there. CPSC Announces ANPR for Table Saws to Address Hand and Finger Injuries

WASHINGTON, D.C., October 17th, 2011. In an effort to address the large number of serious hand and finger injuries that occur each year, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission voted unanimously to publish an advance notice of proposed rulemaking (ANPR) aimed at improving the safety of table saws.

Based on the injury data obtained in a [2007 and 2008 CPSC special study](#) (pdf), staff's injury cost model estimates that consumers suffered about 67,300 medically treated blade contact injuries annually - with an associated injury cost of \$2.36 billion dollars in each of those two years.

CPSC staff estimates from its 2007 and 2008 study of emergency department treated injuries related to table saws, that consumers suffered, on average, about 11 fractures, 11 amputations, and 8 avulsions *every day* from contact with the saw blade.

The ANPR invites written comments from the public regarding the risks of injury associated with table saws and ways in which these risks could be addressed. Following publication of the ANPR, the public will have 60 days to provide comments to the Commission. Comments can be submitted at www.regulations.gov.
