Bargain Box of End Rolls Product Review

A “Woodturner’s Must-Have” says the literature. I don’t know about a ‘must-have’, but it is certainly useful, quality sandpaper at a very good price. The [Klingspor catalog price is \\$31.95 for a 20 pound box](#). My box weighed 22 pounds. It contained 19 2.5” - 4” wide rolls of varying (long) length. The roll inventory was as follows: 2-100G, 1-120G, 2-150G, 3-180G, 2-220G, 2-240G, 1-320G, 5-400G, 1-600G. I have no idea why so much 400G was sent, or why no 500G was in the box, but I would be willing to trade some 400G for some 500G. I will really have to accelerate my woodturning and woodworking efforts to use it all, though. – Bill Draper
