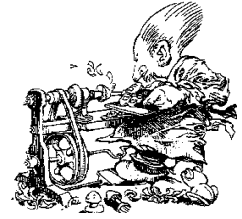

Turn Here for Safety

Always check the speed of the lathe before turning it on. Use slower speeds for larger diameters or rough pieces, and higher speeds for smaller diameters and pieces that are balanced.

I would again like to thank all of the club members who have assisted in turning items for the craft fairs, manning the booth, and setting-up and taking down. Without all of your help, we would not be able to participate in these activities around our community.

We have acquired several new members from our attendance at these events and it is apparent that there are woodturners among us who are looking for assistance in improving their turning skills.

Notes from the June Meeting

Our June meeting was held at Wayne Porter's shop. It was spotless, and reminded me of my place. The only problem was the absence of Dave's Zuni blend coffee. Wayne did a good job running the meeting in our president's absence. DeWayne Walker set up and ran the audio-video equipment because Frank Miller was laid up with some back issues. Wayne Porter filled us in on our successful participation in the Cowboy Festival and Markleeville Craft Fair. Great job members! The club also voted to put our turnings in *Gadzooks*, the new gallery in Gardnerville, on a trial basis for six months.

Wayne came across a local custom tee shirt vendor, and several members signed up for club tee shirts. If you missed the meeting and want to order a shirt, please call Wayne. Shirts are \$9.50 if my memory is working; with a pocket is \$3.00 extra.

Wayne Allen did a great demonstration on turning Banksia pods. He had examples of different things you can make out of them. For the demonstration, he turned a salt shaker. I am a big Wayne Allen fan. I always learn from him and get ideas, as was the case today. You look at how beautiful Wayne's work is and you forget he is only using one eye without depth perception. I can't do what he does with two good eyes. A big thanks to Wayne for the demonstration. He says there may be another in the future.



Show-and-tell was very impressive. Paul Cote had three excellent pieces: two maple burl accent pieces, one with a dye accent on the rim, and a large vase out of cinnamon burl which is beautiful wood. Wayne Porter had a nice apricot vase and a ma-



ple piece with piercing and some popcorn bowls. John Nikakis had two pieces using the wave effect that were really impressive, and two birdhouses using offset turning. John is one of those technical kind of guys. He sees something and then goes home and comes up with a way to do it. He is among our most improved turners in the club right now.



Speaking of John's wave turnings, we are working on bringing John Beaver in for a demonstration in September. He will be showing us the wave technique in three or four different variations. It will be an all-day demonstration. The charge to members will be \$15.00 with the remainder being picked up by CVW. Bring a lunch; refreshments will be provided. The next day will be an all-day hands-on. The cost is \$600 for the day, and the members who sign up will share the cost. We already have five members committed. Further details and dates will be provided later.

My show-and-tell turnings were nothing out of the ordinary: one hollow form piece turned out of incense cedar, and a walnut platter turned out of a piece of graft wood. I did get a big surprise from Mel Swingrover to help me improve my turning quality [Four 120-penny spikes and a pack of 40-grit paper]. He is soooo sweet - in fact I kissed him not once but twice. Dates to Remember

The **Southwest Association of Turners (SWAT)** will hold their 2013 symposium on August 23rd – 25th, 2013, in Waco, TX. Lead demonstrators include Jimmy Clewes, Ashley Harwood, Don Derry, J. Paul Fennell, and Dixie Biggs. Features of the symposium include an Instant Gallery in which woodturners display their work, a Saturday evening banquet that features a raffle of over 30 beautiful turned pieces, a second raffle, using the same tickets, is held during Sunday lunch. This raffle includes a full-size lathe, three midi-lathes, plus an assortment of woodturning tools and accessories. Forty-three vendors will sell equipment and supplies to those attending the symposium at very competitive and usually discounted prices. Lunches are provided during the three-day event. Special Interest Groups will be present for hands-on pen turning, and tool sharpening. There will be a hands-on turning area to try out new tools, obtain one-on-one coaching, or just make some shavings. There will also be activities for spouses.
