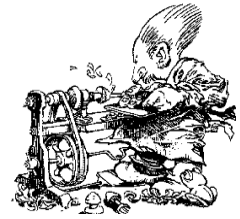

### Let's Be Claro About This

Many of us have referred to the walnut available to us locally as black walnut. Many of us have heard of Claro Walnut and its revered status as a top-notch walnut variety. We also have seen the lighter colored walnut in our club's walnut supply. I decided to do some research and see what the differences are. I referred online to The Wood Database ([www.wood-database.com](http://www.wood-database.com)) and came up with the following.

Black Walnut (*juglans nigra*) is native to the Eastern United States. It might be available here, but not in large quantities. The lighter colored walnut is English Walnut (*juglans regia*) that is grafted onto California Walnut (*juglans californica*) in orchards to improve production. California Walnut is also known as Claro Walnut (*juglans hindsii*). Grafted wood from orchard trees may have a colorful streaked appearance near the graft. The graft area is sometimes referred to as Marbled Walnut and Bastogne Walnut. Claro (Clear)?

We all know that wood moves (sometimes dramatically) when it dries. Here are the shrinkage properties for English Walnut and Claro Walnut, both of which are in our wood stash. – Bill Draper [Wood information reprinted with the permission of Wood-Data-base.com]
