Nick warned us ahead of time that he brought the wrong set of chuck jaws for what he was turning, but would try to “make do” with the jaws he brought along. A small launch occurred with no damage to body or turning, so we got two demos for the price of one. Nick really did do a great job of explaining how to turn a bowl from 2x4. A 14” piece of pallet lumber became a bowl with relative ease. Now that we’ve seen how it’s done, I expect to see a few in the show-and-tell next month. Thanks Nick, you did a great job!

The raffle and wood sales were a hit again as we added about \$300.00 to our demonstrator fund. This really is the least expensive place you will find to buy your turning wood. Most of our wood sells for about 15% to 20% of what you would pay in a store. So the next time you see one of the guys who finds the wood for us, cuts it down, cuts it into usable size for turnings, seals it, stores it, and then brings it out for display and sale—give them a big kiss. A lot of work goes into providing cheap wood for our members. Dave Mills deserves the biggest kiss. He does the most work when it comes to the wood sales—cutting it into smaller pieces, sealing it, and bringing it back and forth to the meetings.

Our annual picnic will be held again at Dave and Pat Colon’s home, 231 Laura Springs Circle, Gardnerville, off Foothill Road. Mark your calendar for Saturday, July 25. Proper Tool Handle Size

Many CVW members have been grinding and hardening their own tools, either at a hands-on session, or in their own shops, then fitting a handle to the new tool. From *The Woodturner's Catalog*, the recommended length of a handle should be at least five times the maximum distance you intend to reach beyond the tool rest. For example, for a maximum reach of 3", your handle should be at least 15" in length.
