

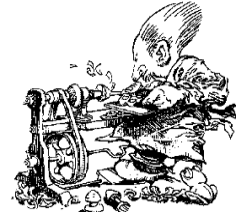

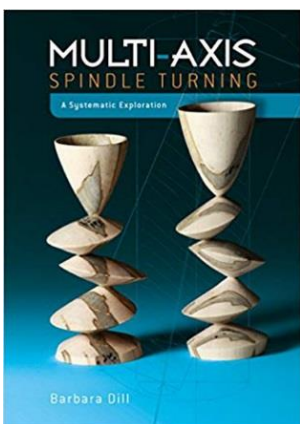
## July Hands-On Report

## Multi-Axis Spindle Turning – Barbara Dill



I've tinkered with multi-axis turning off and on for several years and one great source of information are the articles and YouTube videos I found by Barbara Dill. When I heard back in May that she had a book coming out, I went on-line and pre-ordered a copy. I received my copy on June 28 and read it the first time that night. Barbara, along with quality photos and drawings, explains multi-axis turning techniques that can be very confusing in a way that is simple to understand. She has done the experimenting so we don't have to. She covers the concepts of axis placement and outcome, arc type and circular type cuts with parallel and twisted axes. She then expands on those concepts and the outcomes that can be obtained by mixing cuts and axes. There is a chapter on split and thinned turning. I have not tried these but they look like they will create some very unique turnings. There is a project chapter on making a three-sided cup or vase.

I've made a few of these from past articles and she makes it almost foolproof. She wraps up the book with a chapter on tricks, fixes, and hints. If you want to try multi-axis spindle turning this book will save you a lot of headaches and wood. – John "Nik" Nikakis

## Cocobolo

Cocobolo is a tropical hardwood from the Pacific seaboard of Mexico and Central America. Only the heartwood is used. It is typically orange or reddish-brown in color, often with a figuring of darker irregular traces weaving through the wood. By contrast, the sapwood (not often used) is a creamy yellow, with a sharp boundary with the heartwood. The heartwood is known to change color after being cut, lending to its appeal.



Cocobolo is oily in look and feel, and stands up well to repeated handling and exposure to water: a common use is in gun grips and knife handles. It is very hard, fine textured and dense, but is easily machined, although due to the abundance of natural oils, the wood tends to clog abrasives and fine-toothed saw blades, like other very hard, very dense tropical woods. Due to its density and hardness, even a large block of the cut wood will produce a clear musical tone if struck. Cocobolo can be polished to a lustrous, glassy finish. The high natural oil content of the wood makes it difficult to achieve a strong glue joint, and can inhibit the curing process of some varnishes, particularly oil-based finishes. Care must be used when cutting Cocobolo, because the wood's oils can induce allergic reactions if inhaled or exposed to unprotected skin and eyes. – From Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia.
