

## Annual Gallery of Trees

## A Couple of Sources for Pyrography Patterns

With Jane Miller doing a demonstration on pyrography this month, I thought I would write about a couple of ways that I get patterns. The first is the simplest: Adult coloring books. There are thousands of these so-called adult coloring books available, covering a wide range of subjects. They can be found just about everywhere, and prices start around two or three dollars. I even found one at Ace Hardware for \$1.50.

There are a few ways to use these books. If you trust your drawing skills, you can copy the picture straight to your project or a piece of paper for transferring. You can use tracing paper to make a good copy. I use my multi-function printer and make a copy scaled to the size I want. Use whatever technique you like to transfer the picture to the project and while burning use the original as a guide for detail and highlights.



The second method requires photo software. I use Photoshop Elements; it currently sells for about \$60. Start with a photo that has good edge detail and is not too busy. First, convert the photo to grayscale (Image/Mode/Grayscale). Next, make a duplicate layer by dragging the background layer to the “Create a new layer” icon. Now invert the copy layer (Filter/Adjustments/Invert or Ctrl+I). This creates a negative of the image. Set the blending mode of the layer to Linear Dodge (Top left of Layer window). The image

will change to all white. At this point, I add a Gaussian Blur filter (Filter/Blur/Gaussian Blur), to create a difference between the two layers. I adjust the blur filter until I am satisfied with the results. Now the image can be sized and printed. Again, you can use any technique you like to transfer your pattern to the project. There are dozens of methods for creating line type drawings from photos. This one is fairly easy and you don't need to be a Photoshop geek to get good results. – John "Nik" Nikakis
